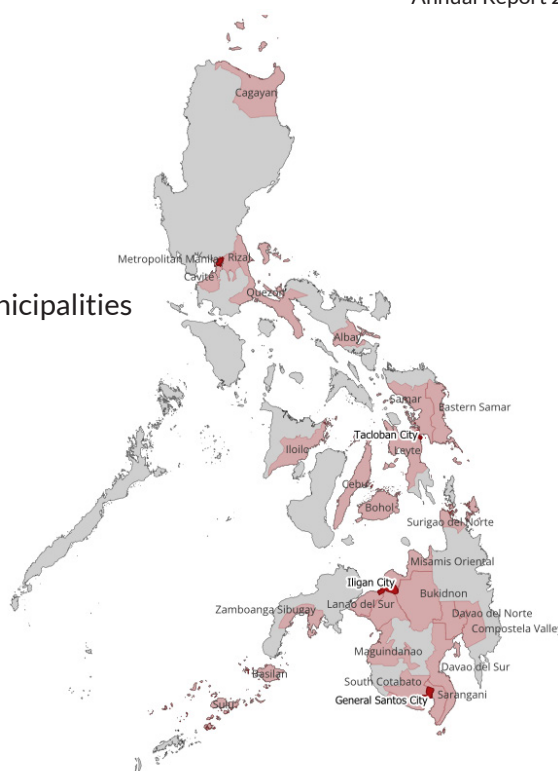

## MESSAGE OF THE CEO

2024 has been a remarkable year for Save the Children Philippines. This year, we made significant strides in organizational governance and in advancing Filipino children's rights and well-being.

After 44 years in the Philippines, we finally became a full member of the Save the Children Association (SCA). With our full membership, we assumed a more important role in the global movement, particularly in the Management Committee, where we championed Save the Children's localization agenda. Additionally, our full membership granted Save the Children Philippines a solid voice in the Members' Assembly, allowing us to put forward our advocacies, perspectives, and unique experiences.

As we approached 2025, and as part of being a full, independent member of SCA, we developed our Organizational Strategy Plan (OSP) 2025-2030. This blueprint outlines our vision for Save the Children Philippines over the next five years: to become the go-to child rights organization in the Philippines.

We aim to achieve this ultimate goal through three organizational strategy objectives:

Driving significant improvements in the health, learning, protection, and participation of the most excluded and vulnerable children.

Ensuring continuous financial growth and stability.

Establishing a fit-for-purpose structure with skilled and competent talents working in a sustainable and inclusive workplace, operating under efficient and integrated systems and processes.

While strengthening our governance and organization, we also achieved significant milestones in providing life-saving aid to

disaster-affected communities, improving the health of children in their early years through immunization, institutionalizing disaster preparedness in schools, enhancing reading levels of learners, and empowering children to become change agents in their own communities. One notable platform for this empowerment is the Lakbay Aral videos, co-designed with children and recognized in the Anak TV Awards 2024.

These advancements were further solidified by legislative achievements. This year, we secured legislative wins with the passage of Republic Act 11650, known as the "Inclusive Education for Learners with Disabilities," for which we led the writing of the implementing rules and regulations, and Republic Act 12080, known as the "Basic Education Mental Health and Well-being Promotion." Additionally, we secured the commitment of legislators to support our key advocacy bills on Positive Parenting and Adolescent Pregnancy Prevention.

Of course, this journey would not have been possible without the unwavering support of the Save the Children Philippines family – its dedicated staff, partners from the academe, corporate sector, government, media, and civil society, individual donors, and most importantly, the children and community partners. Our collective commitment to prioritizing Filipino children's rights and well-being has brought us to where we are now.

As we move forward into the new year, I invite everyone to continue to join us in this mission. Your support – through resource mobilization, policy advocacy, and program collaboration – is as vital as ever.

**Together, we can build a future where every Filipino child is safe, healthy, and empowered.**

## STRATEGY GOAL 1: CHILDREN OF ALL IDENTITIES CONTINUE TO LEARN AND HAVE ACCESS TO SAFE SCHOOLS OR LEARNING SPACES

Save the Children is committed to ensuring children's access to quality education and safe learning environments. In 2024, 84% of targeted 10,900 children aged 0-17 years accessed learning and development programs and services. For younger children (0-5 years), 94% of the targeted 2,900 received health, nutrition, and early learning services. Children aged 6-9 years old saw 97% of the targeted 2,700 participate in education in emergencies, reading remediation programs, and health and hygiene promotion. This included the distribution of learning and hygiene kits and the construction of temporary learning spaces and WASH facilities.

### One Step Closer to a Brighter Future

Fourteen-year-old Saifun from Balo-i, Lanao Del Norte, describes life in Toril as challenging due to limited educational access. Many children, some orphaned by conflict or from impoverished families, attend non-formal schools without adequate resources.

**"We sometimes eat just twice a day since we don't have enough supplies. This affects our studies... Our parents also cannot send us money,"** Saifun shared.

Save the Children Philippines' Return to Learning (RtL) Program, under Project SINDAO, offered hope. It provided hygiene facilities, school furniture, and learning spaces. This resulted in over 93% of RtL children improving literacy and numeracy, with a 96% retention rate for at-risk students.

Saifun is among the 18,000 children in Mindanao affected by inequality and conflict who are supported by Project SINDAO, with funding from the European Commission Humanitarian Aid (ECHO) and its partners.



Around 90% of Filipino children aged 10 struggled to read and understand simple texts according to the World Bank 2022 Report.

Through **Catch-Up Clubs**, we help children read better through a play-based approach to learning and bridge learning gaps to support children to reach their full potential.

## STRATEGY GOAL 2: CHILDREN OF ALL IDENTITIES ARE PROTECTED FROM AND RESILIENT TO RISKS BROUGHT BY THE IMPACT OF COVID-19, CLIMATE CHANGE, DISASTERS, VIOLENCE INCLUDING ARMED CONFLICT, AND EARLY PREGNANCY



Our work prioritizes protecting children from various risks and building their resilience. In 2024, 74% of 5,300 children aged 10-17 years old benefited from child protection, remedial learning, and adolescent health programs and services. Key initiatives included online safety programs, participation in risk reduction and climate adaptation, and advocacy against teen pregnancy and child marriage. We also mounted eight humanitarian responses to assist communities affected by extreme weather events, directly reaching 41,016 individuals.

### Nata's Fight for Peace and Well-being

Growing up in a Malabon informal settlement, 17-year-old Nata witnessed poverty's harsh realities, linking it to rising teenage pregnancies.

**"It's really devastating. These children are supposed to be enjoying their childhood... Instead, they're raising children of their own,"** she said. Nata understood her mother Jennelyn's sacrifices after having her first child at 19. Despite their closeness, emotional distance marked their family.

Seeking stronger bonds, they joined Save the Children's Family Development Approach (FDA). For Nata, the sessions were pivotal. "Communication is the key. FDA emphasized the importance of expressing what we want..." Her relationship with her mother improved: "Honestly, my mother and I became closer through the FDA. We now exchange ideas and opinions we couldn't talk about comfortably before."

Jennelyn affirmed, "FDA teaches us to cherish and love our children and help them claim their rights." Now called PaMILYah!, the program promotes adolescent sexual health and rights. Nata believes, **"by learning about your rights, you will know how to avoid early pregnancy and its consequences."** She envisions a protected, educated, and poverty-free future for children.



In 2024, our innovative Project TaMBaYan (*Tatay na Mapagkalinga sa Bahay at Samahayan*) successfully supported numerous fathers and male caregivers. This project, located in Malabon City, directly acknowledges and tackles the unique issues and challenges encountered by male-dominated groups, such as tricycle drivers, in their crucial roles as parents.

Through **Project TaMBaYan**, participating fathers and male caregivers not only learned about children's rights but were also introduced to the important provisions of the Safe Spaces Act and essential concepts of road safety.

## STRATEGY GOAL 3: CHILDREN OF ALL IDENTITIES ARE ABLE TO PARTICIPATE MEANINGFULLY IN COMMUNITY AND GOVERNANCE PROCESSES

Save the Children believes in the importance of children's voices being heard. We made significant strides in children's participation, with 93% of 1,136 children trained in 2024 demonstrating an understanding of their rights. 70% of 73 child-led groups have been trained on children's participation and of this number, 86% of the child-led groups comprising 780 children, were mobilized and actively engaged in various initiatives. They engaged with decision-makers on key children's issues like inclusion, online safety, peace education, mental health, and teen pregnancy prevention - among others.

### From Kindness to Action: Drew's Mission to Keep Children Safe Online

At 14, Drew initiated hot meal distribution for street children in Trece Martires City, sparking Usbong Kabataan. This child-led group, now 20 strong, believes small acts create change. Partnering with Save the Children's Protect Children Philippines, they address Online Sexual Abuse or Exploitation of Children (OSAEC) and Child Sexual Abuse or Exploitation Materials (CSAEM) in Cavite, where over 40 cases were reported from 2019 to 2023.

Usbong Kabataan now leads community learning sessions on children's rights and online safety. "We consider our partnership with Save the Children a lifelong achievement... We are now confident in facilitating learning sessions while also ensuring safe spaces for everyone," Drew stated. They advocate for Republic Act 11930's full implementation, aiming to make their city a child protection model.

Drew and Usbong Kabataan prove children can lead safer community creation, online and offline, but need support.



In 2024, Save the Children Philippines, together with the Cavite Provincial Government and De La Salle University-Dasmariñas, entered into a historic agreement to combat the alarming rise of OSAEC. Through our **Protect Children Philippines Project**, this crucial collaboration focuses on strengthening local child protection, advocacy for policy changes, development of effective resources, and establishment of child safety standards.

## STRATEGY GOAL 4: STRENGTHENED CAPACITY OF COMMUNITIES TO DEVELOP THEIR AGENDA FOR AND WITH CHILDREN AND TO HOLD GOVERNMENT TO ACCOUNT FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF LOCAL STRUCTURES AND SYSTEMS THAT ENSURE INCLUSIVITY, PROTECTION, RESILIENCE, AND MEANINGFUL CHILDREN'S PARTICIPATION

We work to empower communities to advocate for children's rights and hold governments accountable. In 2024, 76% of targeted community support groups completed training on children's rights with at least 91% of their trained members supporting child participation. These groups supported children's participation in platforms like Children's Councils and engaged in local protection and risk reduction mechanisms, such as the drafting of a Child Protection Policy in Maitum, Sarangani.

### A Village for Change: Caloocan Community's Collective Effort Against Adolescent Pregnancy



The Bagong Silang Child Rights Advocates (BSCRAds), a local civil society organization established in 2007 through the initiative of Samahan ng Mamayan - Zone One Tondo Organization, Inc. (ZOTO), spearheaded the “*Wastong Kaalaman, Ligtas na Kinabukasan*” campaign to tackle adolescent pregnancy in Caloocan. This endeavor went beyond mere workshops, igniting BSCRAds’ capacity to lead community change.

Teacher and member Leah Tabirao felt deep fulfillment: “I truly appreciate the support. My heart is full and I feel good being able to help people in our community.”

The campaign fostered a sense of collective action, evidenced by BSCRAds President Jocelyn Cerdon’s observation: “When you see participants taking action, it brings a sense of fulfilment... everyone is taking part and will be there for you.” This highlights BSCRAds’ growing ability to mobilize their community for open dialogue and a safer future for children.

Save the Children’s support to local advocates such as ZOTO and BSCRAds contributed to their success in shaping their own agenda and advocate for inclusive and protective systems, demonstrating the lasting impact of investing in community-led solutions.





## STRATEGY GOAL 5: GOVERNANCE THAT ENABLES CHILDREN TO PARTICIPATE MEANINGFULLY THROUGH SAFE AND INCLUSIVE MECHANISMS AND ARE ACCOUNTABLE AND RESPONSIVE TO DELIVER QUALITY AND INCLUSIVE PROGRAMS AND SERVICES TO UPHOLD CHILDREN'S RIGHTS

Save the Children advocates for governance that is responsive to children's needs and ensures their meaningful participation. In 2024, around 80% of local government units worked on child participation policies. We collaborated with government agencies to integrate child participation into local governance and influenced national and subnational policies to strengthen children's rights and participation. Furthermore, 100% of targeted local government units (LGUs) localized the Comprehensive Emergency Program for Children (CEPC), and 60% of 25 LGUs allocated budgets for child-responsive programs and services based on children's input.

### Finding Her Voice: Karen's Journey from the Sidelines to Leadership

Karen's unexpected entry into Save the Children's Kabataan Konek program ignited her leadership journey. Initially a quiet observer, the 14-year-old was soon elected president of her barangay's and then municipality's child-led groups. By 16, she represented her peers through Kabataan Konek, a program promoting children's participation in governance.

Kabataan Konek uses child-centered social accountability (CCSA), encouraging children to voice their opinions on issues affecting them. "As a child leader, my dream is for every child to achieve their dreams and desires," Karen shared. She values dialogues with community leaders as "a helpful avenue for us" to present children's ideas.

Believing "it's important for children to talk to other children," Karen dreams of becoming a lawyer: **"Being the voice of the voiceless is something I look forward to."** Her transformation highlights the power of child participation and empowerment, demonstrating how programs like Kabataan Konek cultivate leadership and community among children.



In 2024, Caloocan City had its first girl-led coalition in recent history. Through Save the Children Philippines' **Kabataan Konek**, these adolescent girls are boldly confronting teenage pregnancy and child abuse, declaring, **"Babae ka, hindi babae lang"** – a testament to their strength and vital role in community transformation.

# HUMANITARIAN

Amidst the numerous disasters that the Philippines faced in 2024, Save the Children successfully continued its mission to be at the forefront of emergencies, prioritizing children in every response.

Save the Children Philippines directly reached 41,016 unique individuals through collaborative humanitarian work with partners. 1,522 households received cash assistance, 4,745 students received back-to-school kits, and 2,107 children received mental health and psycho-social support.

Other accomplishments included the distribution of hygiene kits, household kits, hot meals, and newborn kits. Save the Children Philippines also conducted trainings for its Emergency Response Teams (ERTs).



## For Vulnerable Children, El Niño Means Leaving School

Thirteen-year-old Migue in Gandara, Samar, stopped schooling due to the El Niño-induced drought that devastated his family's rice farm. "Waray kwarta (No money)," he explained.

His aunt and caregiver Nimfa, struggles with dried fields and debt, forcing her to take temporary work. "I can't harvest now because of El Niño... I can't pay my debt," she lamented. Western Samar experiences high levels of economic hardship and is among the hardest-hit provinces.

Despite this, Migue yearns to return to school, recalling his enjoyment of English. "I would like to go back to school, but not for now," he said.

Save the Children Philippines and Western Samar Development Foundation Inc., provided PhP 10,000 cash assistance and livelihood trainings to 200 families, including Migue's.

Nimfa plans to raise a hog to generate income for Migue's education. "I hope I can go back soon, so I can continue my studies, graduate, and find work," Migue wished, dreaming of becoming a seaman or engineer.



In the Philippines, millions of children are affected by disasters and emergencies each year, particularly due to climate-related events like typhoons and floods.

Together, we can bring hope, relief, and a brighter future to countless children across the country. **Let's support their continued learning** by providing learners with safe back-to-school kits, temporary learning spaces, lifesaving essentials, and access to health, education, and protection interventions.

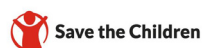

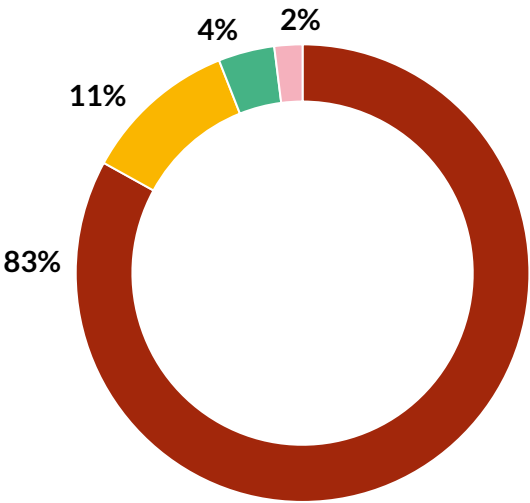
